s we bid farewell to 2023, we reflect on a year of resilience, compassion, and achievements. This year, the Humane Indiana Shelter & Adoption Center endured a 10% increase in surrendered and abandoned pets. Due to hardships and a lack of affordable, pet-friendly housing, shelters nationwide like Humane Indiana are seeing a dramatic rise in surrendered pets, magnified by a significant decrease in adoptions.



Joshua, a stray, senior cat, arrived at Humane Indiana severely emaciated and wounded. Joshua's ears were necrotic and decaying, and he was suffering from FIV and

diabetes. Our team attentively treated Joshua and started him on insulin. After five long months in the shelter, this sweet, gentle fellow was adopted into a loving home.

Your support through donations, adoptions, and fostering makes it possible for us to weather this storm and care for the homeless and sick who are just like Joshua.

In 2023, the Humane Indiana Wildlife Rehabilitation & Education Center experienced a staggering 11% rise in

wildlife admissions, taking in over 150 species this year, including a state and federally endangered tri-colored bat. Humane Indiana is the first rehabilitation center in Indiana to raise and release a sandhill crane colt and a clutch of trumpeter swans—the largest clutch of its kind in state history.

As we face the challenges of unprecedented animal intake, we recognize and thank you, our dedicated volunteers, foster caregivers, and supporters: you are the heroes who give these animals hope.

SANDY GOES TO THE SMITHSONIAN!

Sandy, the sandhill crane, who had been treated at the Humane Indiana Wildlife Rehabilitation and

Education Center recently became a permanent resident of the Bird House at the National Smithsonian Zoo in Washington, D.C.

Sustaining an injury to her wing, Sandy had been in rehabilitation for five years at another wildlife center in Indiana. Sandhill cranes have specific needs, a special diet, and strive to be around other cranes. In captivity, they can live up to 50 years! Sandy was admitted to Humane Indiana

in late 2023 and it was determined that the injury had caused a 10% loss in wing length, making her unable to ever fly again. Despite this, Sandy was still active and in high spirits. Since Sandy was unable to be released to nature, the best home had to be found: the Smithsonian National Zoo in Washington, D.C. came to the rescue!

"The Smithsonian gives Sandy a new lease on life," notes Nicole Harmon, Wildlife Director at Humane Indiana.

After well-wishers gave Sandy a send-off celebration, Harmon, along with the wildlife team, traveled ten hours, across the country, to personally escort Sandy to her new home. Upon arrival, Sandy quickly adapted—immediately foraging, tossing, and playing with straw. She will share a home with two other sandhill cranes, among turkeys and geese, in an enclosure with a pond and a stream.

Sandy will always be in the hearts of wildlife lovers in Indiana, and she is now a national treasure, greeting visitors from around the world in our nation's capital. We are truly grateful to everyone who supported Sandy along her journey.
